Experienced puzzlers consider not only the literal meaning of each track, but also similar, which they have seen before, often repeated answers, syntax jokes, puns, cultural references - and, of course, the theme of the puzzle. Unfortunately, this means that crossword puzzles can be completely unkind to newcomers. Everyone starts somewhere, and no matter what your skills look like now, here are four general strategies to help you improve. Do puzzles every day The only way to improve on crosswords is to do a lot of them, and the best way to do that is to work them into your daily routine. For me, it means solving a few puzzles from the old book 365 Will Shortz crossword puzzles before bed every night. My mom prints Washington Post crosswords and chips away at them over breakfast: my friends who commute by bus or train are diehard fans of New York Times crossword puzzles. Mondays are easiest, Saturdays are the hardest, and puzzles between ramp up from day to day so you can choose the ones that work for you. That means the New York Times is far from the only publisher out there. The Washington Post, Los Angeles Times and Merriam-Webster also publish American-style daily crossword puzzles; If mystery crosswords are your jam, try The Guardian. Some organizations, like queer crosswords and puzzles for progress, even send you original themed puzzles as a reward for nonprofit donations. Read moreObtaining, you should solve every track you can without help, but you can not improve without prompting. A little strategic cheating can lead you through even the toughest puzzles. Apps make it super easy: just check or reveal the letters one by one until you can solve a particularly nasty clue. It only gives you so much information to (mostly) turn it on its own, which makes the answer more likely to stick in mind. Paper puzzles make strategic cheating a little harder, but thanks to the Internet, not by much. If you're stuck on print crosswords, Google the entire track in quotation marks. Framing your search around guides rather than, say, how many letters you need to work with will help you understand what the guide wanted from you. Over time, you'll find that you need less and less help solving puzzles that would have been real stumpers before. Study Up If you're serious about crossword mastery, the internet is full of similarlyvalysing people who would love to help. A blog like Rex Parker is a great place to start. Solves New York Times puzzles every day, compares difficulty with other puzzles from that day of the week, and breaks down key clues/answer pairs in a short post. Among the posts and comments, you'll have a more complete picture of the solution than if you just looked into the response. You can also specialize even more and dust off crosswords - words that often appear in crosswords, but almost never in conversation. The New York Times has a quiz that tests your knowledge of crossword puzzles, and there is a more general guide Dictionary.com. Perhaps predictably, there's also an entire website dedicated to crossword puzzles, with a new word featured every day and an extensive archive. If the statistical approach is more of your speed, there are crossword answer databases out there. Data scientist Noah Veltman analyzed a set of crossword puzzles and answers in the New York Times from 1996-2012, then arranged them with crossword puzzles and how often they appeared. You can filter lists by minimum number of skins or word length to see details about the response. Similarly, Xwordinfo.com you the most popular answers and clues for times puzzles by year or length of the word. Hell, you could go to everything and encode some training programs like guy did, although it is not clear whether his approach is more effective than just doing a lot of crossword puzzles. This does not mean that you need to build a robot or memorize clues to solve crosswords more effectively. The best training strategy is the one that makes you happy. There are simpler crossword leads for this answer, like meat for breakfast, but the strips in the club makes your mind go to a completely different place. I guess you're not thinking about a club sandwich, which is where you have to be to get an answer. For some more puzzles that will test elastic thinking, try to find the missing words in these puzzles. Answer: BACON aydngvnl/Shutterstock Lots of crossword puzzles contain this answer and it's in a variety of ways, from hard to easy. It's a word with lots of vosoes and an S, so it provides a nice crossword puzzle. Sometimes he'll know about Tony at NYPD Blue. This help provides another stylistic hint to let you know that you are looking for a name because you use the first name Tony in help. Monday and Saturday's puzzles might contain the same answers, but Saturday's tracks will be much more challenging. Editors Will Shortz and Joel Fagliano don't usually use tracks that are gloomy or too dark. The clue referred to in this word is a less obvious meaning, a collective noun for crows—they have nothing to do with premeditated killing. If you've figured it out, you might be ready for these intricate detective puzzles. Answer: MURDER aydngvnl/Shutterstock When you see a crossword lead with a question mark, you can plan for fun to find the answer. Michael Sharp, the crossword expert behind the alias Rex Parker, notes the language used in crossword subcultures such as puns and crosswords (words common in puzzles, but not in real life). Tilt the column? The leash is definitely a pun. has nothing to do with the Leaning Tower of Pisa as you would initially think. A question mark allows you to know that you have to think differently. The answer is OPED PIECE. Still confused? Read this as an op-ed, a newspaper column expressing an opinion, or you know, leaning. Let's see if you can solve the first crossword puzzle ever published. Answer: OPED PIECE aydngvnl/Shutterstock Some crosswords consider trilbies, which in 1987 was one of the toughest crosswords of all time. Part of the fun for solvers is figuring out obscure words and using knowledge of little-known trivia to find the answer. It might help you know Trilby apparently refers to a character in a 1894 novel who had beautiful legs. It also appears as a synonym for feet in 1911, and in the crossword puzzle dictionary in the 1970s. Talk about obscure! Answer: LEGS aydngvnl/Shutterstock You can rely on crossword puzzles to be filled with all kinds of trivia related to opera, classical music, literature, geography and mythology. Crosswords have an inner treasure trove of classic knowledge that can pull to fill the grid. But you will also need a solid understanding of popular culture and the digital age. Since the answer here has nothing to do with the Greek myth of Pandora in Hesiod's Work and Days:Answer: INTERNET RADIO aydngvnl/Shutterstock The answer to this track appears in the crossword puzzle quite regularly. Sometimes it has easy tracks and sometimes they are heavier. If you ever get a clue looking for an Italian volcano, you can pretty much count on the answer being ETNA. It can also be knowledgeable as a Sicily smoker (note the pun) or Volcano of Sicily (pretty simple). Beware of clues like Mount's is a poker term when reading backwards. Got? If you can't get enough of puzzles, take these printable crosswords with you. Answer: ETNA aydngvnl/Shutterstock You can rely on crossword answers appearing in the same form as their tracks. In this case, the hint is surrounded by quotes, which means that it is a spoken phrase. It's also casual and slangy in the way it uses the word yes. So you can be sure that the answer will be a phrase that denotes the same thing and that contains informal language or slang. Answer: I've heard that YA aydngvnl/Shutterstock The answer here is more crossword puzzles: it's hard or easy to get depending on the difficulty of the guide. In this case, the word outpatient (an adjective related to walking) is quite obscure if you don't know a secondary meaning: A noun referring to a church aisle. If the clue is four letters and has something to do with the church or altar, the answer is often (as is the case in this case) APSE. Let's see if you can solve the most challenging puzzles ever. Answer: APSE aydngvnl/Shutterstock You can bet you're in for some mind-bending hijinks when the crossword track is in parentheses. In general, this means that the guide refers to nonverbal communication or some other indirect reference, as in the example [Here] Psst. However, there are no hard and fast rules for parentheses in crossword puzzles. One aspect that makes hard tracks so much fun for wordies is their nuanced pun that makes you think outside the box. Are you ready for some snowy fun? Try these mathematical puzzles only the smartest gets right. Answer: IM SAD aydngvnl/Shutterstock Crosswords will often have clues that refer to prefixes, suffixes, or words or terms that come before or after a response. Clues try to trip you up a little with indirect phrases, so you're thrown off the trail. In this case, the leash wants you to think of three letters that could come before ops. The answer is SYS, as in sysops. This is the term for administrators on websites or newsouts, short for system operators. That's probably the first thing I can think of, right? Answer: SYS aydngvnl/Shutterstock Dust off all your Shakespeare fatoids because they always appear in crosswords. You'll need to know games for tracks like Winter ____ Fill in the blank with the TALE answer. Think of characters like OBERON, The King of Fairies in 'A Midsummer Night's Dream.' It's also a good idea to dust off the remarkable lines from games. In the case of this track, you need to be familiar with Act II, Scene VII as you like. Jaques' speech explains the seven ages of man, from infant to adulthood to second childhood, and eventually reaches a line that contains the answer: Sans teeth, no eyes, no taste, no everything. Sans is French without, by the way. Answer: SANS aydngvnl/Shutterstock Crosswords often refer to the secondary meaning of terms to get an answer. Salmagundi is an English salad consisting of many different ingredients such as meat, anchovies, veggies and a variety of spices. It also refers to any mixture or hodgepodge. It's also used to upset OLIO's response. Olio is one of those words that often appears in crosswords. It refers to Spanish goulash, but also to keep your eyes open for clues that relate to a mishmash, assortment or collection, mixed bag, spicy stew, or a little of that and that.
